As We Gather: Being Given Daily Bread

The Fourth Petition, "Give us this day our daily bread," is the middle one of the seven petitions, holding a central place in the model prayer which Jesus taught the disciples in response to their request. Examples of God giving in response to the requests of His children fill the pages of Scriptures. God knows our needs and responds to them in accordance with His good and gracious will. In his New Testament letter, James states very plainly: "You do not have, because you do not ask." (James 4:2) The children of God ask their dear Father for all good things and await His blessings. In worship we listen to God as He speaks to us, and we respond in prayer confident that He hears and will meet all our needs of body and soul. From the earthly to the eternal, we pray continually for the Lord to give us this season, and every season, our daily and life-giving bread.

Reading From Holy Scripture

Matthew 6:25-34

"Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life? And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you. "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble.

The Small Catechism – The 4th Petition of The Lord's Prayer

LSB 323

- L "Give us this day our daily bread." What does this mean?
- God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.
- **L** What is meant by daily bread?
- Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like.
